However, these benefits come with limitations. Body cameras are only as effective as the policies governing their use. Malfunctions, intentional deactivation, and privacy concerns can undermine their potential. Therefore, while promising, they are not a panacea.

## The Limitations and Challenges

The effectiveness of body-worn cameras is often compromised by selective footage release. In some cases, footage is withheld from the public or edited, which can erode trust and fail to hold officers

accountable. Moreover, research indicates that the presence of cameras does not always alter police behavior significantly. A study in Washington, D.C., found no statistically significant effect on police use of force from wearing body cameras.

Acknowledging these challenges, it becomes clear that while body cameras are a step in the right direction, they are not a cure-all. Ensuring consistent policies for camera use and footage release is crucial in maximizing their potential.

## **Beyond Cameras – Addressing Systemic Issues**

Focusing solely on body-worn cameras ignores the root causes of police brutality, such as racial profiling and inadequate training. Cameras do not address these systemic issues. Therefore, it is imperative to advocate for comprehensive reforms in law enforcement, including improved training on de-escalation techniques and addressing racial biases.

Body-worn cameras can play a significant role in enhancing police accountability and transparency. However, they are not a standalone solution to the complex issue of police brutality. Comprehensive reforms addressing the systemic roots of the problem are essential.
