
How Small Housing Unit In London

According to a report by the financial services company LV, typical British family housing has seen “fundamental changes” in recent years. Although the most common family homes in England are still semi-independent three-bedroom homes, more and more families live in apartments. Between 2008 and 2013, the proportion of families living in apartments or apartment suites (maisonette, two-story apartments with independent portals) soared by nearly a quarter. Currently, 10% of households use this type of home.

In this report, a couple or a single parent is referred to as a family home with at least one house in which a child under the age of 18 lives. Official figures show that in 2003, the average size of British family housing was 98.8 square meters, and by 2013 it had been reduced to 96.8 square meters. The reduced two square meters is equivalent to the size of a cabinet with a cleaning tool, a laundry room or a small bathroom. At present, typical British family houses have two floors, each of which is 8.6 meters long and 5.2 meters wide. The ground floor includes a kitchen and a large room with a living room and dining room. Upstairs, in addition to the bathroom, there are only two large double bedrooms.

The remaining one is smaller and can only be placed on a single bed. The area outside the house is also decreasing year by year, with an average of 164.1 square meters in 2003 and 163.2 square meters in 2013, and in 1983, the area was 168 square meters. Recently, the Royal Institute of British Architecture (RIBA) report expressed concern about the reduction in the housing area of the British, especially the lack of space for storing items. The report cited an example of a couple living in a new apartment in Liverpool who did not have enough space in their home to put a vacuum cleaner. You can only take the car 20 minutes a week to the man's mother's home to take the vacuum cleaner, and then send it out after use. Many families who were interviewed said that if they bought a lot of things from the supermarket, there was not enough space in the house to store them, and sometimes they left things in the car. For the latest report, the director of the LV Family Insurance Department said: “The average family home has changed dramatically over the past five years. More and more families are living in apartments or renting houses. Many families are now making temporary changes to their homes.

"The LV report shows that between 2008 and 2013, the proportion of households renting from private sources increased from 15% to 19%.
