Jullien believed that it would be lucrative in the aspects of cultivating peace among states and nations, as well as an exploit on an opportunity to increase and grow mutual trust and contribute ideas among educators. In the mid-19th century, Jullien's ambitions became real. Representatives from the Germany, The United States, England, and France met in London to design a plan for a permanent organization responsible for managing international education, in which was fully established in 1876.

Moving forward in the timeline, study abroad programs continued with significant growth, these programs only started developing more and more in the 1980's and early 1990's as technology became more renovated, stronger infrastructures, broader communication and an ever-rising emphasis on tourism (Lee, M. 2012). Due to this constant growth provided assortment in the activities available to all students whom study abroad, that in fact, resolved in producing a wider selection of classes in assorted fields, potentiality for lab work, internships, humanitarian relief efforts and many more options to choose from (Harvard University, n.d.). Therefore, the sum of students whom commissioned to studying abroad programs grew from 71 thousand in 1990 to 283 thousand in 2012.
